SPLIT, CROATIA



Split, Croatia, known for its Diocletian's Palace, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the world's best-preserved Roman structures, is the second-largest city in Croatia after Zagreb.

In the heart of Dalmatia along the Adriatic coast, Split is a central hub for travelers, offering direct ferry connections to popular islands like Hvar, Brač, and Vis.

How to get there?



To reach the city, many travelers fly into **Split Airport (SPU)**, located about 15 miles west of Old Town.

To get to Split from the airport, travelers can rent a car, jump in a **Taxy Uber or Bolt App.**

Apps like Bolt or Uber are widely used in Croatia and they have the best prices.

The easiest and quickest way to get to Hotel is taxi.

(if you share a cost, 2 person, almost the same price as a bus)

Adress of Hotel is **AC Hotel Split, Ul. Domovinskog rata 61A, 21000, Split**

To the Hotel Marriot you can take



- **Bolt** - estimated travel time - 23 minutes, distance 20 km, estimated **price 20-25 EUR**
 - **By local bus PROMET BUS** - travel time - 1 hour, **bus number 37, direction Trogir** - airport- Split, **price 5 EUR**
/ go out at station **BRODARICA**
 - **By SHUTTLE - Pleso shuttle** - travel time - 30 minutes, **price 8 EUR**
- HINT: from main bus terminal you have 30 min of a walk or 10 minutes by car

How to get around Split, Croatia?



Walking is the best way to get around Split, as it is the most convenient and enjoyable way to experience the city. The city center is compact and pedestrian-friendly, and you can easily walk to all the main attractions, such as the Diocletian's Palace, the Riva promenade, the Cathedral of Saint Domnius, and the Marjan Hill.

However, if you stay further away from the old town, you can mix and match different transportation options to suit your needs and make the most of your trip.

The city boasts an efficient bus network connecting key destinations, including the airport, ferry port, bus station, train station, and major shopping centers. Additionally, convenient bus routes are available to nearby beaches and museums. Tickets can be purchased directly from the bus driver, kiosks, or vending machines, offering one-hour access across any bus line.

Is it OK to drink tap water in Split Croatia?



The tap water in Croatia is routinely tested for quality and safety, you can confidently drink tap water throughout the country.

Is tipping expected in Croatia?



Tipping in Croatian restaurants is fairly standard practice, even though it is not enforced in any way. You would expect to leave a tip of around 10% if you were happy with your meal.

Is Split safe at night?



Is it safe to walk during the night in Split? The city, as well as the country it is in, is very safe and they both have extremely low crime rates. The safest parts of the city to walk around at night are the central districts and waterfront. But while you're walking around the narrow streets of Old Town and Diocletian's Palace, be wary of potential pickpockets that might target tourists.

Go Hajduk! Locals love their soccer team Hajduk Split (pronounced "HIGH-dook") as much as they abhor their rivals, Dinamo Zagreb, and you'll see Hajduk's red-and-white checkerboard design, encircled in blue, all over town.
